Local Cinema Fans Support Station

Give a person a camera, and they will make a movie. Or, in the case of a group out of East Nashville, give a bunch of people a television studio and broadcast tower, and they will fill the airwaves with original programming.

Nashville's latest broadcast station is WGGK, Channel 4, and is the brainchild of Jesse Fletcher, a Nashvillian whose work has been shown at several film festivals, both local and around the country. His IMDB entry shows only shorts, but that's a reflection of his focus on local filmmaking rather than a lack of expertise.

Another figure involved is Mel Toustin, a quiet woman who formerly worked for the NSA as a mathematician. The technical aspects of setting up the station attracted her to the local group.

"It's really about cult movies and a tiny, niche audience. In the internet era, everybody can broadcast to the world, but there's room for a specialized group that makes local productions for a local audience," she said. And that audience is growing.

While ad sales have been minimal, the cost of production has been stable and within the means of the station, and they feel that they will be able to bring their unique local perspective for many years to come

"It's all about the mix," said Rene Tervalon, a fan of the station, "they show old 50s movies in better quality that you can get online, and they have emcees that make modern observations."

Referring to a show popular during the 1990s, she said, "It's like MST3K!"

The Cleveland branch of the Federal Bureau of Investigation has opened a temporary office in Nashville. The Cleveland office, which deals with special circumstance events, such as the recent explosion at Jim's Armory off Nolensville Road.

- 1 **Purchases of items.** Nobody wants to have to wander off and wait for ten minutes out of game to go buy a handgun.
- 2 **Influencing the city.** Pitting businesses against businesses or gaining more control over the local television stations requires extended draws without much roleplay.
- 3 **Personal actions.** If you are doing something that *nobody* else is involved in, it *might* be a candidate for a downtime action.

If it can be a scene, that's not a downtime, that is what game is!
